The 2011-2012 Michigan Pops Executive Board



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Music Director



Yaniv Segal has been a versatile musician and performer from a young age, appearing on stage extensively as a violinist, violist, singer, actor and conductor. He is a founder of the Chelsea Symphony in New York City - an orchestra that provides unique performance opportunities for instrumentalists, composers and conductors - and music director of the Michigan Pops Orchestra in Ann Arbor. The New York Times praised his interpretation of Mahler's Fourth Symphony as an "earnest, vibrant account," and Esquire Magazine profiled him as a rising star that is "redefining classical music." In the spring of 2011, as part of the Ludwig Van Beethoven Easter Festival, he made his Polish guest-conducting debut with the Opole Philharmonic of Poland and was immediately reengaged for the following season. In the 2011-12 season he makes his

debut with the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, Sinfonica Siciliano in Palermo, and Macon Symphony and returns to guest conduct the Greenwich Village Orchestra and the Chelsea Symphony.

The son of a New York Philharmonic violinist and a respected violinmaker, Yaniv began to play the violin at age four and to sing at age eight. Yaniv sang in the children's choir at the Metropolitan Opera under maestros such as James Levine and Georg Solti and with the Bolshoi Opera under the direction of Valery Gerghiev. He later performed the role of Colin in the first national production of "The Secret Garden," touring the United States and Japan. His acting career continued with a role in Tom Stoppard's "Hapgood," at the Mitzi Newhouse Theater in Lincoln Center, where he appeared alongside actors Stockhard Channing, David Lansbury and David Strathairn. As a concert violinist, he was a prizewinner and soloist with the Yonkers Philharmonic on two occasions. As a chamber and orchestral violinist and violist, he was an active freelancer in the greater New York area, playing with ensembles such as the Bridgeport and Allentown Symphonies.

While an undergraduate at Vassar College, Yaniv co-founded and served as music director of the Mahagonny Ensemble - an ensemble dedicated to music of the past 100 years - and also was the assistant conductor of the Vassar College Orchestra. In the years that followed, he worked as an assistant conductor with the New York Youth Symphony, Princeton Symphony and at the Manhattan School of Music. Among others, Yaniv has conducted the Ensemble Orchestral de Paris, New Symphony Orchestra (Bulgaria), Thüringen Philharmonie (Germany), Ukrainian State Symphony, Castleton Festival Orchestra, University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra, Manhattan School of Music Symphony, Greenwich Village Orchestra, and Stamford Young People's Symphony.

Music Director

Yaniv has participated in masterclasses with several preeminent conductors, such as Kurt Masur, Michael Tilson Thomas and Lorin Maazel. He is currently at the University of Michigan, where he is jointly pursuing a Doctorate in Musical Arts in conducting with Kenneth Kiesler and a Master of Music in composition with Kristin Kuster.

As a child of Polish and Israeli immigrants, Yaniv grew up speaking three languages in a multi-cultural household. In support of his education, achievements, and contributions to American Society he was one of thirty-two national recipients of the Paul and Daisy Soros Fellowship for New Americans in 2009. Yaniv is represented by the Ludwig Van Beethoven Association.



Assistant Music Directors

Anthony Do-Hoon Kim is a graduate student at the University of Michigan, pursuing a Master of Music degree in Orchestral Conducting under the guidance of Maestro Kenneth Kiesler. He is the Assistant Music Director of the Michigan Pops Orchestra, where he will begin serving as its Music Director in 2012. At the UM School of Music, Theater & Dance, he acts as the Assistant and Cover Conductor for the University Symphony, University Philharmonia, and Campus Symphony Orchestras. Anthony holds the B.M. and M.M. degrees in Piano Performance from the University of California, Santa Barbara, where he was a student of Charles Asche. During his graduate years at UCSB, Anthony served as the Assistant Conductor and General Manager of the University



Symphony Orchestra, in addition to serving as a teaching assistant to the orchestral conducting courses. In 2009 he became the Founding Music Director of the Dead Composers Society Orchestra, a campus-based community ensemble made up of some seventy students and faculty members from across all fields and majors. Anthony previously served on the conducting staff of the Thousand Oaks Philharmonic, Santa Barbara Youth Symphony, South Coast Reading Orchestra, and the Campus Philharmonia Orchestra.

Assistant Music Directors



Before coming to Michigan, Anthony studied at the Pierre Monteux School, Conductors Retreat at Medomak and Conductors Institute at Bard. He has worked with conductors such as Gustav Meier, Michael Jinbo, Harold Farberman, Lawrence Golan, and Richard Rintoul. As a violinist and violist, his orchestral experiences have been with the San Diego Youth Symphony, La Primavera Orchestra of Orange County and the All-Southern California Honor Orchestra, among others. He has received career grants from the Léni Fé Bland Foundation and is a recipient of numerous awards, including the UCSB Outstanding Graduate Student of the

Year Award, Ernö Daniel Memorial Award for Distinguished Performance, Santa Barbara Music Affiliates Quarterly Performance Award, first place awards from the MTNA and MTAC competitions, and the first prize at the Saddleback Symphony Young Artist Competition, which subsequently led to performances with the orchestra as a concerto soloist. As a featured performer, Anthony has appeared both as a pianist and conductor on Southern California's Classical KDB 93.7 FM and on Maine's Public Broadcasting Network Stations. In the recent years he has received coaching and master classes from artists such as Leon Fleisher, Yuval Yaron, Yael Weiss, Julie Bees, Noel Engebretson, and the Juilliard String Quartet.

An avid lover of the outdoors, Anthony enjoys backpacking and traveling with his friends when he is away from the music. During his spare time he finds himself stuck in the corners of used record stores, while searching for the ultimate ethnic food experience. More importantly, he is an über follower of the Los Angeles Lakers and is the founding member of the world renowned piano community, We Bang Steinways!

Matthew B. Dell is thrilled to join the Michigan Pops Orchestra and looks forward to becoming one of its music directors in 2012. He has conducted the University of Michigan Symphony and Philharmonia Orchestras, UM Campus Orchestras, Yale Symphony Orchestra, University of Kentucky Symphony Orchestra, Johnson City Symphony, and Yale Glee Club, among many others. He has worked on productions with the University of Michigan Gilbert and Sullivan Society, Opera Theatre of Yale College and University of Kentucky Opera Theatre. As an educator, he is the creator and performer of the "What is Conducting?" workshop for children. In addition, he has produced and conducted a concert celebrating the works of PDQ Bach. He currently studies conducting with Kenneth Kiesler at the University of Michigan, having earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in music from Yale University.

Vocalist

Described by the San Francisco Classical Voice as "a young performer who could sing the sword out of Wotan's tree", tenor **Brian Carter**, a native of North Carolina, has gained national attention as a singer with Wagnerian potential. After performing professionally for years as a cellist, he discovered classical singing and went on to pursue vocal studies earning a Bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina - Greensboro and a Master's degree from the University of Houston. Currently, Mr. Carter is a student of baritone Stephen Lusmann, pursuing his Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Michigan.

Candide Overture

In this operetta based on a novella by Voltaire, the protagonist Candide is forced to embark on an journey around the world steeped in misery and hardship.

Peer Gynt

Peer Gynt, exiled from his village, sets off on a series of fantastical adventures. "In the Hall of the Mountain King," a troll mountain king offers to change Peer into a troll if Peer would marry his daughter. "Morning Mood" evokes the rising of the sun as Peer travels the world.

The Ballad of Sweeney Todd

Sweeney Todd is the story of a barber who returns to London after being exiled for a crime he didn't commit. In his barbershop, he seeks revenge on those who had made him suffer, especially the corrupt judge who had imprisoned him and stolen away his wife and daughter.

I'll Know from Guys and Dolls

Guys and Dolls is the story of two highstakes gamblers who fall in love with virtuous women. "I'll Know" is an insistence by one of the women, Sarah, that her love will be a God-fearing, honest man that she will know on sight, not the sleazy Sky Anderson.

March to the Scaffold

An artist, in a state of despair after being rejected, drugs himself and enters a strange dream. He has murdered his beloved and is sentenced to be executed. After the guillotine does its work, the crowd cheers wildly as his severed head rolls down the steps.

"Vesti la giubba" from Pagliacci

Canio, a clown in a comedy troupe, discovers that his wife has been cheating on him. Nevertheless, he must "put on the costume" and prepare for his performance that night, as the show must go on.

Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring

The classic fantasy tale by J.R.R. Tolkein is the story of how an idyllic hobbit is tasked with the ultra-important mission to destroy the One Ring. Accompanying him across Middle Earth is the Fellowship of the Ring, an eclectic group of characters, whose camaraderie grows throughout their journey.

Prelude from Act III of La Traviata

Violetta, a courtesan in Paris, falls in love with a nobleman Alfredo. However, they are forcibly separated by Alfredo's



father and the Baron. Before they can reunite, Violetta becomes ill, and she dies in the arms of Alfredo when he finally returns.

The Jetsons Meet the Flintstones

What happens when two of the most beloved cartoon families meet? Utter chaos! In this animated TV special, Elroy Jetson builds a time machine that inadvertently transports the Jetsons to the Stone Age, where they meet the Flintstones. After a freak accident, the Flintstones are transported to the Space Age.

Porgy and Bess

Porgy, a crippled beggar, falls in love with Bess, who is also pursued by other suitors. Set in Charleston in the 1920s, this opera portrays the vibrant life of African Americans in Catfish Row.

"If I Loved You" from Carousel

Carousel is the second musical by Rodgers and Hammerstein and takes place on the Maine coastline. A carousel worker falls in love with a female millworker, which ends up costing them their jobs and they must make ends meet in other ways.

The Sorcerer's Apprentice

Left by his master to do chores, the apprentice decides to enchant a broom to fetch water for him. However, he finds that he cannot control his magic and mayhem ensues. This piece was featured in the Disney film *Fantasia* as well as its sequel *Fantasia* 2000.

Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone

An unhappy boy raised by his aunt and uncle finds out that he is in fact a wizard and is invited to the Hogwarts School of Witchcraft & Wizardry. There, he finds a home, but an evil presence lurks beneath the surface...
