artist Angela Veomett's multimedia cantata Chernobyl Generation, scored for women's chorus and digital media. Christopher Rountree joins the Michigan Pops Orchestra this semester as Asst. Counductor. A graduate student in the School of Music Theatre and Dance, Christoper studies orchestral conducting with Kenneth Kiesler. He works with four other orchestras on campus; serving as conductor of the Campus Symphony and Philharmonia, guest conductor of the University Philharmonia, and assistant conductor of the University Symphony. Before coming to Michigan, Christopher was principal conductor of the La Primavera Youth Orchestra in Orange County Cali-

fornia, and was a private student of Joana Carneiro.

The Michigan Pops bids adieu tonight to its longesttenured member Michael Chang. Michael is in his twelth season with MPO and was one of the founding members in 1995. He leaves the University for California's Silicon Valley with a Bachelors and PhD in Electrical Engineering, focusing his research on circuit design for wireless communication. To commemorate Michael's dedication to the orchestra we are instating the Michael Chang Chair as the last chair in the second violin section, which is where Michael preferred to sit as he embodied the principal that all seats in the orchestra are equally important. Michigan Pops is pleased to welcome Daniel Bernard Roumain (DBR) back to the University of Michigan. Known for fusing his classical music roots with a myriad of soundscapes, this Haitian-American artist has carved a reputation as a passionately innovative composer, performer, violinist, and band leader.



His unique hybrid style continues to capture new music lovers worldwide. From Australia's Sydney Opera House to Boston's ICA Museum, DBR continues his 2008 worldwide tour premiering solo works and pulsing duets off of his debut international solo album etudes4violin&electronix (Thirsty Ear Recordings). As a composer, his dramatic soul-inspiring pieces range from orchestral scores and energetic chamber works to rock songs and electronica. All converged in DBR's One Loss Plus, his multimedia premiere at BAM's 2007 Next Wave Festival, which kicked off the festival's three-year residency of DBR commissioned works. His lively ensemble, DBR & THE MISSION, makes its international debut at Australia's 2008 Adelaide Festival.

Did you know?

Superman

- The first superman, created by Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster, was a villain bent on world domination. The story did not sell, forcing the authors to change the character to the super-hero who hit comic stands in 1935.
- Superman has been in comics, television, the movies, radio, and even Broadway.
- Superman is also nodded to in 2006's *Hollywoodland* which tells the story of the death of George Reeves who stared in the first Superman T.V. Series.
- Christopher Reeve starred in the Superman movies.
- Interstingly, there is no relation between Christopher and George.
- Real firefighters were used to film the scene in the chemical plant in *Superman III*, not actors!
- Superman III (premiering June 17, 1983) had stiff competition in the box office. Return of the Jedi premiered on May 25, 1983, and Octopussy premiered on June 10, 1983. The result was that while the first two movies both grossed over \$100 million, Superman III only earned \$60 million.

Sweeney Todd

- Sweeney Todd first appeared in a penny part serial by E. Lloyd called *The String of Pearls: A Romance*.
- Sweeney Todd, the Demon Barber of Fleet Street opened on Broadway in 1979.
- The musical has won Tony Awards for Best Musical, Best Book, and Best Score.
- Stephen Sondheim, who wrote the music and lyrics, has also composed music for *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Follies, A Little Night Music,* and *Into the Woods*.
- The musical was recently adapted to the big screen directed by Tim Burton and starring Johnny Depp. This is their sixth collaboration.
- Sondhiem is protective of his work and only agreed to the movie if he could approve the casting.
- Helena Bohnam Carter, who plays Mrs. Lovett, sent twelve audition tapes.

Themes from 007

- James Bond was created in 1952 by Ian Fleming and starred in 12 novels and 2 anthologies. Since Fleming's death, more novels have been written by five other authors.
- There have been 20 different James Bond films from *Dr. No* in 1962 to *Casino Royale* in 2006.
- There have been seven different Bonds, including Sean Connery, Roger Moore, and Pierce Bosnan, to name a few.
- Other actors have tried to play Bond. Liam Neeson, Mel Gibson, Sam Neill, Hugh Grant, and Lambert Wilson were all rumoured to be in the running for Bond in *GoldenEye*.
- The films have netted over \$4,000,000,000 at the box office. When this amount is adjusted for inflation this amounts to over \$11,000,000,000!!!

Intermezzo from Cavalleria Rusticana

- The Godfather is based on a novel by Mario Puzo.

- The Intermezzo is the music playing in the background when The Godfather dies. It has been featured in other films including Raging Bull, the 1999 version of A Midsummer Night's Dream, and In the Heat of the Sun.
- Cavalleria Rusticana is actually an opera about a young man who returns from war to find his fiancée had married another. It ends tragically with the death of the young man.
- Mascagni wrote 16 other operas.
- The cat in the opening scene of Godfather was not called for in the script, but was a stray found by Marlon Brando that morning. Because of the volume of the cat's purring, many of the lines had to be re-recorded.

Night on Bald Mountain

- This piece was originally written for piano.
- This piece was inspired by Russian literature, and the witches' sabbath tone poem was completed on St. John's Eve. Hence it is sometimes called St. John's Night on Bald Mountain.
- Though completed in 1867, the piece was not performed until the 1900s.

Voodoo Violin Concerto

- Daniel Roumain attended the University of Michigan and was involved with the Michigan Pops during its inaugural season.
- About the Voodoo Violin Concerto, DBR says, "This violin concerto is most concerned with the notion of the ritual, or our collective rites of passage... I find "Tribe" in all of its primitive repetition, to, perhaps, be the most accurate depiction of where we are right now, as a collective, civilized society; a collective, civilized world."

Spider-man

- Spiderman first hit shelves in August 1962 in *Amazing Fantasy #15*, a comic book anthology put out by Marvel Comics.
- Stan Lee, who created Spiderman, also wrote episodes of *Captain America*, and the comics *X-Men, The Incredible Hulk*, and *The Fantastic Four*.
- Stan Lee was actually a pen name for Stanley Martin Lieber, but the name became so popular that Stan changed his name.
- The green smoke for the Green Goblin in the first Spiderman movie was actually white and turned green using CG because the special effects team could not make a green smoke that was not poisonous.
- Danny Elfman also worked on the scores for *The Hulk, The Simpsons* (comic and movie), *Meet the Robinsons*, and *Chicago*.

Video Games Live

- Video Games Live is "is an immersive concert event featuring music from the most popular video games of all time" according to the website. The full concert also features music from Mario, Zelda, Final Fantasy, and Sonic.
- Halo is one of the most popular Xbox games and over 2.4 million Halo 3 games are played online in a 24 hour period.
- Kingdom Hearts is a Play Station 2 game that follows a young adventurer Sora as he, Donald, and Goofy try to save Sora's friends and wander through such Disney movies as Aladdin, Nightmare Before Christmas, Peter Pan, Alice in Wonderland, The Little Mermaid, and Hercules.

Obi-Wan Kenobi and Anakin Skywalker in *Star Wars Episode III: Revenge of the Sith*. This duel required the two actors to train for two months in fencing and fitness in order to do the scene.

- George Lucas, the writer and director of the *Star Wars* movies, also wrote the *Indiana Jones* series and received a Life Achievement Award from the American Film Institute in 2005.
- Ewan McGregor, who played the young Obi-Wan Kenobi, asked Lucasfilm productions to make him a looped reel of Alex Ginness's scenes as the original Obi-Wan.
- John Williams has been composing movie music since 1962, and working as a pianist even longer.
- Some of Williams' most famous works include *Jaws*, The *Star Wars* movies, the *Indiana Jones* movies, *Saving Private Ryan*, the *Harry Potter* movies, *Jurassic Park* and *Superman I*.
- Ben Burtt was the voice of R2D2 and the heavy breathing of Darth Vader in all six films, the first of which was filmed in 1977.

Defying Gravity

- The musical *Wicked* is based on Gregory Maguire's book *Wicked: The Life* and *Times of the Wicked Witch of the West*.
- The musical will come to East Lansing in July of this year.
- The original Broadway cast included Kristin Chenoweth as Glinda and Idina Menzel as Elphaba (The Wicked Witch).
- The part of Glinda was expanded from a "peripheral figure" to a large starring role specifically for Ms. Chenoweth.
- Idina Menzel also starred in Rent.
- Wicked was nominated for ten Tony awards including both ladies for Best Actress (Musical) and Stephen Schwartz for Best Score.
- Stephen Schwartz has also written music and lyrics for *Godspell, Pippen, Pocahontas*, and *The Prince of Egypt*.

Hercules

- The story of Hercules comes from Greek Mythology. Hercules is the son of the God Zeus and a mortal by the name of Alcmena.
- Mark Antony felt he resembled Hercules and even made up a story about a son of Hercules whom he claimed he descended from.
- In Greek art, Hercules is often identified by a lion skin and a club.
- Hercules may be best known for the twelve labors that he performed for the Tiryns' King Eurystheus. One of the most famous in cleaning the Augean Stables.
- Agatha Christie played on the twelve labors of Hercules in her Hercule Poirot series, creating a book of 12 short mysteries based on the labors.
- The poet Pindar wrote the "Tenth Olympian Ode" where he claims Hercules created the Olympic Games to honor his father Zeus.
- James Wood, who voiced Hades, loved the character so much that he reprised it in the *Kingdom Hearts* video game.
- The lion skin used in the animated movie is actually Scar's skin from The *Lion King*.
