At the end of the day, the Dicks and Janes (or DJs, for short) are an uncomfortably close family who strive for musical excellence with a wide range of songs in their rep, from 1920s Jazz standards to 1960s Psychedelic Rock to the Top 40 hits of today. Elena Chambers - Concerto Competition Winner

Elena Chambers is a violinist from Ann Arbor, Michigan, where she is currently a student of Gabe Bolkosky. She is the winner of the 2017 Michigan Pops Orchestra Concerto Competition and a recipient of a 2015 Forum Music Festival Outstanding Musicianship Award. She has twice been selected as an MSBOA Outstanding Soloist and has attended numerous summer festivals including the Indiana University Summer

String Academy, Green Mountain Music Festival, PhoenixPhest Chamber Music Festivals, and Green Lake Chamber Music Festival. Her string quartet and piano quartet, A2four, won the 2015 and 2016 Michigan Chapter of the American String Teachers' Association Quartet Competition, and she has participated in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival as a member of a featured quartet and as a member of the Honors Orchestra. Elena has played in masterclasses for Almita Vamos, Mimi Zweig, the Carpe Diem Quartet, the Bergonzi Quartet, and the Kontras Quartet, among others.





Music Director - Rotem Weinberg

Rotem started his conducting studies at the age of 17 in his native Israel. He earned his B.M. in orchestral conducting at the Buchman-Mehta School of Music of Tel-Aviv University, where he studied with Prof. Yoav Talmi. Currently, he is pursuing a Master's degree in orchestral conducting at the University of Michigan with Prof. Kenneth Kiesler.

Rotem led many orchestral, band, and vocal studentensembles in Israel, achieving national acclaim as a conductor and educator. Recently (summer of 2016), he was invited to guest conduct the Israel National Youth

Band. He received many honors and awards for his conducting and musicianship, including the *America-Israel Cultural Foundation Merit Scholarship* in orchestral conducting and the *Tel Aviv University Dean of Arts Excellence Scholarship* for his outstanding musical and academic achievements.

Assistant Music Director – Tal Benatar

Tal Benatar is an Israeli-American conductor, arranger, guitarist, vocalist and pianist from Columbus, Ohio. He graduated from the University of Virginia in 2014 with a B.A. in Music and Political Science. At UVA, he served as the Music Director of the Academical Village People (AVP), a men's a cappella group winning critical acclaim for the studio album *Another Round*, produced under his leadership. Tal also pursued conducting at UVA, studying with Kate Tamarkin and Michael Slon.

Tal has made conducting appearances with the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra, The Charlottesville Symphony, The Charlottesville Opera, The Albemarle Sinfonia and The Oratorio Society of Virginia, of which he served as Assistant Conductor for the 2015-16 season. He was the music director of the Rapidan Orchestra, a community orchestra in Central Virginia focused on bringing Western Art Music to more remote audiences. As a genre defying musician, Tal has had a range of experiences playing music from the Baroque Era as a continuo player, to Jazz standards on the piano and guitar. As a strong advocate of new music, Tal sings with the //meridian vocal ensemble, has conducted a world premiere by University of Michigan composer Aaron Hendrix, and will be featured as a guitar soloist in an upcoming performance with University of Michigan's Orpheus Singers.

Tal is currently a Master's student in Orchestral Conducting at the University of Michigan, studying with Professor Kenneth Kiesler.

Program Notes

Slavonic Dances, Op. 46, No. 8

Dvořák was Czech, but the term "Slavonic" has a much broader reach. The Slavs are the largest ethno-linguistic group in Europe, its members including Russians, Poles, Ukrainians, Serbs, Czechs, Bulgarians, Croats, Slovaks, Macedonians, and others. Conflict between the Slavs and Western Europeans has been a ubiquitous part of the continent's history, and the distinctiveness of these two groups' musical heritages is representative of that division. This music is clearly not German (think Beethoven and Brahms) and most definitely not French.

The Slavonic Dances were composed early in Dvořák's career. Inspired by Brahms' Hungarian Dances, they were initially written for piano four hands but orchestrated upon Dvořák's publisher's request.

The music constantly alternates between major and minor key. Can you hear the difference?

Symphonic Dances from "Fiddler on the Roof"

We continue our sojourn in Slavic Europe, now performing the music of Jews in Tsarist Russia. The story of *Fiddler on the Roof* centers on Tevye, a poor milkman. Each of his three daughters chooses to marry a husband who strays further from the traditions that the family holds true. The story occurs against the backdrop of an increasingly anti-Semitic Tsar, whose soldiers evict Tevye, his family, and his friends from Anatevka, their *shtetl*, in Act II of the musical.

The music for this Broadway show (and later film) was written by Jerry Bock. These dances come mostly from the musical's wedding scene. The wedding is quite the affair, complete with copious amounts of food and drunken men dancing while balancing bottles on their heads.

Waltz from "The Sleeping Beauty" Suite

The Sleeping Beanty, one of Tchaikovsky's most popular ballets, was premiered in St. Petersburg in 1889. Swan Lake, one of his earlier ballets, was met with little enthusiasm, so Tchaikovsky felt particularly compelled to knock the house down with this one. Sleeping Beanty, the 1959 Disney Film, was heavily based on Tchaikovsky's ballet – including this waltz, which is Princess Aurora and Prince Phillip's theme. (Note: the Michigan Pops Orchestra performed a section from this ballet at our Fall concert.)

Carmen Suite

Carmen is an opera in four acts by French composer Georges Bizet. It is set in southern Spain and tells the story of the downfall of Don José, a naïve soldier who is seduced by the wiles of the fiery gypsy Carmen. He abandons his childhood sweetheart and deserts his military duties, but he loses Carmen's love to the glamorous toreador Escamillo. The opera ends when José kills Carmen in a jealous rage. This suite was compiled posthumously by Bizet's friend Ernest Guiraud. Habañera, the second movement that we are performing tonight, is one of the most famous Opera arias ever composed. Carmen sings this aria as she enters the stage for the first time; what an introduction!

The Lord of the Dance

Lord of the Dance was an Irish musical and dance production that was created, choreographed, and produced by Irish-American dancer Michael Flatley. Flatley envisioned a show that could be performed for mass audiences in arenas and stadiums rather than smaller audiences in theatres. The show was most popular in the late nineties, when many troupes of dancers toured North America, and the show was performed at the Oscars. Two troupes still tour the world today.

West Side Story: Selections for Orchestra

This musical, set in 1950's Upper West Manhattan, is based on Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. The two rival gangs, the Sharks and the Jets (Montagues and Capulets), are of different ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds. Consequently, Tony and Maria's love is universally ridiculed. But unlike the Shakespeare tragedy, Maria (Juliet) survives to tell the tale!

Leonard Bernstein's music is iconically *American*, similarly to Aaron Copland, whose music we will play later in this program. The soundtrack for this musical spent 54 weeks at No. 1 on Billboard's album charts, the longest run at No. 1 of any album in history.

Overture to Die Fledermaus

The opera *Die Fledermaus* (The Bat) was composed by Johann Strauss II, of Vienna, in 1874. It is known as an *operetta*, a light opera of a comedic nature. It tells the story of Dr. Falke, who takes revenge on his friend Gabriel for playing a practical joke. Dr. Falke is affectionately known as "The Bat" because he one wore a bat costume to a ball and had too much to drink, spent the night on the street, and became the talk of the town when he walked home the next morning, still wearing his costume.

Listen for this overture's famous waltzes. Played in the Viennese style, the three beats in each measure do not last for equal lengths of time. The second beat is played slightly early, keeping dancers (and audiences) on their toes.

Concerto No. 1 in g minor for Violin and Orchestra, Op. 26

This romantic concerto was premiered in 1866, conducted by none other than Bruch himself. It is by far the most famous of Bruch's violin concertos, a classic stepping-stone piece for aspiring violinists. The first movement, *Vorspiel*, functions as a prelude to the second movement. But it is a beautiful piece in and of itself, full of conversation between the soloist and the orchestra.

The solo is performed by Elena Chambers, winner of the Michigan Pops Orchestra's Concerto Competition. The competition is open to all Ann Arbor high school musicians. We are very proud of Elena and her impressive résumé of musical accomplishments.

A Michael Jackson Spectacular

Michael Jackson, the "King of Pop," made his professional debut in 1964 with his elder brothers Jackie, Tito, Jermaine, and Marlon as a member of the Jackson 5. *Thriller*, which he released 22 years later, has become the bestselling album of all time. *Forbes* has ranked Michael Jackson as the top-earning dead celebrity; his estate continues to earn \$825 million per year in royalties.

Chicago

This musical, premiered in 1975, is set in prohibition-era Chicago. It is based on a play of the same name by reporter and playwright Maurine Dallas Watkins, who was assigned to cover the 1924 trials of two accused female murderers for the *Chicago Tribune*. Around this time, Chicago's press and public were riveted by the subject of homicides committed by women. Several high-profile cases arose, generally involving women killing their lovers or husbands. These cases were tried against a backdrop of changing views of women in the Jazz age. A lore arose that, in Chicago, feminine or attractive women could not be convicted. *Chicago*, the musical, tells the show-stopping story of the two vaudevillians (variety performers) Velma and Roxie, both accused of murder and defended by the same lawyer. Their competition for fame and fortune drives the musical's plot.

The city of Chicago has a rich history of Jazz music. Chicago Jazz (versus other types of Jazz, like New Orleans Jazz) is known for its emphasis on fast-paced music and solo playing instead of a unified ensemble sound.

Hoe Down from "Rodeo"

The ballet *Rodeo* was composed by Aaron Copland, one of the most famous composers in the history of American music. It was premiered in 1942. Hoe Down is the fifth section of the ballet; its music is most well-known. The main theme is based on the American folk song "Bonyparte" or "Bonaparte's Retreat," originally played by Kentucky fiddler William Hamilton Stepp. The suite includes many other famous eighteenth-century square-dancing tunes.

Mamma Mia Medley

Mamma Mia!, premiered in 1999, is a jukebox musical written by British playwright Catherine Johnson, based on the songs of ABBA. The music is composed by Benny Andersson and Björn Ulvaeus, former members of the band. The show is still performed in London's West End today. "Dancing Queen," a Europop version of American disco music, was ABBA's only number one hit in the United States.

About the Michigan Pops Orchestra

The Michigan Pops Orchestra is the oldest student-run, student-directed collegiate pops orchestra in the United States. The organization was founded in 1995 by Warren Hsu, a University of Michigan student committed to enhancing musical diversity across campus. He advertised the Orchestra as one that performed music that students wanted to play and that no other orchestras on campus were programming. Hsu also wanted to give Ann Arbor residents unfamiliar with orchestras an opportunity to have orchestral experiences in a fun and exciting atmosphere. To this day, Hsu's initial motives are still Pops' biggest priorities.

Members of the Michigan Pops come from all parts of the University of Michigan community. Most musicians are not music-majors. Most of our music directors have been graduate students in the School of Music, Theatre, and Dance. Today, we have over 100 members, and we are managed by an executive board of 13 students.

The Michigan Pops Orchestra is an official University of Michigan student group. We are funded by the University Activities Center, UAC.
