

Music Director - Rotem Weinberg

Rotem started his conducting studies at the age of 17, under the guidance of Vag Papian. He earned a B.M. in orchestral conducting at the Buchman-Mehta School of Music of Tel-Aviv University, where he studied with Prof. Yoav Talmi. He earned his Master's degree in orchestral conducting at the University of Michigan. Currently, he is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts (D.M.A) degree at the University of Michigan with Professor Kenneth Kiesler. Rotem participated in workshops with world renowned conductors, including Simon Rattle, Zubin Mehta, and Zsolt Nagy.




In his native Israel Rotem led many orchestral, band, and vocal ensembles achieving national acclaim as a conductor and educator. He received many honors and awards for his conducting and musicianship, including the *America-Israel Cultural Foundation Excellence Grant* in orchestral conducting, and the *Tel Aviv University Dean of Arts Excellence Award* for his outstanding musical and academic achievements.

Rotem currently serves as the music director for both the Michigan Pops Orchestra and Campus Philharmonia Orchestra at the University of Michigan. In the fall of 2017 he served as the cover conductor for the University of Michigan's production of William Bolcom's new opera "Dinner at Eight", assisting Prof. Kathleen Kelly.

Assistant Music Director - Tal Benatar

Tal is an Israeli-American conductor, arranger and guitarist from Columbus, Ohio. He is currently pursuing a Master's degree in Orchestral Conducting at the University of Michigan, studying with Professor Kenneth Kiesler. He also serves as the Assistant Conductor of the U of M Life Sciences Orchestra.





Symphony, The Charlottesville Opera, The Albemarle Sinfonia and the Oratorio Society of Virginia, with which he served as Assistant Conductor for the 2015-16 season. He was the music director of the Rapidan Orchestra, a community orchestra in Central Virginia focused on bringing Western Art Music to more remote audiences.

As an arranger and orchestrator, Tal has been commissioned by the Michigan Pops Orchestra, the Rapidan Orchestra, the Academical Village People among others. He has experience arranging for a vast array of ensembles including jazz combos, vocal ensembles, as well as chamber and full orchestra.

As a genre defying musician, Tal has had a range of experiences playing music from the Baroque Era as a continuo player, to Jazz standards on the piano and guitar. A strong advocate of new music, Tal sings with the meridian vocal ensemble, has conducted a world premiere by University of Michigan composer Aaron Hendrix, has been featured as a guitar soloist with University of Michigan's Orpheus singers and has performed on electronics with the U of M Contemporary Directions Ensemble and University Symphony Orchestra.



Soloist - Allison Prost

Allison Prost is a current Master's student studying with Professor David Daniels at the University of Michigan. As a student, she frequently performs on art song recitals, instrumental chamber music concerts, and in U of M's main stage operas. Her most recent roles include La Contessa in Mozart's Le Nozze di Figaro and the leading role of Milicent Jordan in William Bolcom's Dinner at Eight (2017). As a community member, she likes to stay involved in Ann Arbor and Metro Detroit's music communities by participating as an active board member for both the Arbor Opera Theater and Detroit Women's Chorus. After graduation, she hopes to move forward in the opera world by participating in Young Artist Programs for regional opera theaters throughout the country.

Soloist - Michael Floriano

Baritone Michael Floriano is currently a Master's student at the University of Michigan where he has been seen as Demetrius in A Midsummer Night's Dream and Oliver Jordan in William Bolcom's *Dinner at Eight*. Last summer Michael sang as Sciarrone in *Tosca* with Finger Lakes Opera. In 2016 Michael was part of the Studio Program at Central City Opera where he sang as Joe in John Musto's *Later the Same Evening*, as well as Albert in *The Ballad of Bahy Doe*. Other credits include Tarquinius in *The Rape of Lucretia*, Anthony in *Sweeney Todd*, Count Almaviva in *Le Nozze di Figaro* and Mr. Jones in *Street Scene*. An avid recitalist, Michael recently performed Schubert's *Die Schöne Müllerin* at the Kerry Town Concert Hall in Ann Arbor. Upcoming performances include a return to Central City Opera for the summer of 2018 where



Michael will perform in *Il Trovatore* and *The Magic Flute*. Michael is also a graduate of The Oberlin Conservatory and The Janiec Opera Company at the Brevard Music Center.



Soloist - Kevin Starnes

Kevin Starnes has performed a variety of styles in a career spanning over twenty years. Praised for his "powerful voice" and "rich tone", Mr. Starnes is a baritone based in Fenton, Michigan. Credits include The Duke in Gounod's Romeo et Juliette, Theseus in Britten's A Midsummer Night's Dream, and Max in Bolcom's Dinner at Eight. Most recently, he sang the role of Bartolo in Mozart's Le Nozze di Figaro under the baton of Maestro Martin Katz. Mr. Starnes will soon be graduating from the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre, and Dance with a Master's of Music in voice performance.

Concerto Competition Winner



Katie Sesi, 17, is a senior at Ann Arbor Huron High School, where she is the Concertmaster of the Symphony Orchestra, thanks to the devotion and attention of her violin teacher Sunmi Chang. She made her orchestral debut with the Grosse Pointe Symphony Orchestra has been a winner of the Rosalie Edwards Youth Music Competition, the American Protégé International Concerto Competition, the Lansing Symphony Orchestra Concerto Competition, Grosse Pointe Symphony Concerto Competition, and the Huron High School Concerto Competition. She is a member of the Michigan Youth Symphony Orchestra and was named to the Michigan All-State Orchestra, and Honors Orchestra. Katie was twice nominated as an Outstanding Soloist and was chosen as a Michigan Youth Arts Festival Concerto Finalist.

Katie started the Young Musicians Mentors Alliance, a collaborative relationship in which high school orchestra students mentor local middle school orchestra students after school, receiving funding through a grant from the Ann Arbor Public Schools Educational Foundation. In addition, Katie has raised \$40,000 for children with cancer at The University of Michigan Mott Children's Hospital by busking at the Ann Arbor Art Fair for ten years and collecting tens of thousands of returnable cans and bottles. She also plays #1 singles for the Huron Women's Varsity Tennis Team, was named Captain, and has been selected as an All-State Athlete for three years. As a Girl Scout since the fourth grade, she has received her Bronze, Silver, and Gold Awards, and was selected as the Girl Scouts of Southeastern Michigan's Young Woman of Distinction for her Gold Award project.

In her free time, she enjoys watching K-Dramas, The Office, or Harry Potter as well as drinking bubble tea with her friends. As a future Wolverine, she is extremely excited to be performing with the Michigan Pops Orchestra tonight. Katie will be attending the University of Michigan this fall, seeking a degree in Violin Performance under the instruction of Professor Aaron Berofsky.

Program Notes

Beauty and the Beast Overture, Alan Menken arr. Michael Kosarin

In this orchestral overture from the new motion picture, we venture into the forgotten castle of the Beast and his servants. Follow the story of Belle, a bookloving girl from the small town of Villeneuve as she transforms from the Beast's prisoner to his true love. This love lifts the curse from the prince and his servants. Dance through the halls of the magnificent castle with the Beauty and the Beast!

Scheherazade, Op. 35, IV. Festival at Baghdad, Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov Rimsky-Korsakov's tone poem, based on *The Arabian Nights*, depicts the story of the main protagonist, Scheherazade. Rimsky-Korsakov included a program note in the score, intended for use in concert programs: "The Sultan Schariar, convinced that all women are false and faithless, vowed to put to death each of his wives after the first nuptial night. But the Sultana Scheherazade saved her life by entertaining her lord with fascinating tales for a thousand and one nights. The Sultan, consumed with curiosity, postponed from day to day the execution of his wife, and finally repudiated his bloody vow entirely." This final movement combines themes of previous movements, including the famous violin solo, depicting the enchanting beauty of Scheherazade's storytelling.

The Bare Necessities from *The Jungle Book*, Terry Gilkyson arr. Franck van der Heijden

Baloo the bear tells the story of the bare necessities of life. Inspired by Rudyard Kipling's book, the animated film "Jungle Book" of 1967 brought us this extraordinarily recognizable tune, amongst many others, remembered beyond half a century! Tonight, we are thrilled to welcome Kevin Starnes, a graduate student in vocal performance to sing with us.

Selections from Les Misérables, Claude-Michel Schönberg arr. Bob Lowden Claude-Michel Schönberg and Alain Boublil's adaptation of Victor Hugo's epic novel depicts the June Rebellion of 19th century Paris through thrilling musicality and overwhelming scale. The musical has become a favorite in the theater and on the screen through the Academy Award winning film. This suite includes famous numbers such as "At the End of the Day", "I Dreamed a Dream", "Master of the House", "On My Own", and "Do You Hear the People Sing."

Romeo and Juliet Suite No. 2, I. Montagues and Capulets, Sergei Prokofiev This excerpt from Prokofiev's famed ballet paints the image of the dueling houses of Verona with a brilliant opening: juxtaposing the dissonance and power of the winds with the calm pianissimo of the strings. This gives way to the famous Dance of the Knights, in which the tragic character is brought forth. Listen for the stark contrasts and color changes, from heavy strings to a light flute solo, portraying the archaic quality of Shakespeare's masterful stage work.

Suite from Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them, James Newton Howard, arr. Patrick Rozell

Magi-zoologist Newt Scamander arrives in 1926 New York City with nothing but a suitcase in this prequel to the Harry Potter series. He isn't carrying an ordinary suitcase, however, but one filled with Magical creatures from around the world. These majestic beasts cannot be contained, as they run loose around the streets of New York. As Newt fights to protect the creatures, he also finds himself stuck in the middle of a bigger plot against the magical society. The suite combines the Harry Potter universe's "Hedwig's Theme", as well as the "Main Titles", "Macussa Headquarters", "Newt's Friend", and "Ending Titles".

Aladdin - An Orchestral Suite, Alan Menken arr. Danny Troob

We travel across the desert into the fabled city of Agrabah. Aladdin journeys to win the heart of Princess Jasmine with the help of the genie and the magic lamp. From the jazzy tunes of the Genie as Aladdin marches into Agrabah, to the journey across the world on the magic carpet, this medley has it all! Hear the orchestra play lifetime favorite pieces such as "Arabian Nights", "Friend Like Me", "A Whole New World", and "Prince Ali."

Overture to "Candide", Leonard Bernstein

In an effort to write "The Great American Opera", Leonard Bernstein wrote the opera Candide, based on Voltaire's satirical novel written in 1759. The overture has become standard concert repertoire and is known for its tight thematic structure. Within the overture, Bernstein weaves in a brass fanfare with tunes from the most notable songs of the opera, "Glitter and be Gay" and "Make Our Garden Grow." We celebrate this wonderful music on the hundredth anniversary of Leonard Bernstein's birth.

Violin Concerto in D Major, III. Finale, Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky

We are thrilled to invite Katie Sesi, 2018 MPO Concerto Competition winner, as she plays the third movement of Tchaikovsky's virtuosic Violin Concerto. Perhaps the most recognizable concerto in all the string repertoire, the third movement of Tchaikovsky's D major concerto offers a wide range of emotional content, from a thrilling Russian Dance to a lyrical song, transitioning seamlessly from one mood to another. Known for its technical difficulty, this concerto premiered three years after being finished, as most violinists were too nervous to take on the task of a public performance.

Forrest Gump Suite, Alan Silvestri arr. Calvin Custer

Our favorite runner, ping-pong player, shrimper, speaker, and All-American football player Forrest Gump travels the world on an adventure, away from his home in Greenbow, Alabama. Hear his story at the bus stop as he tells you about his life as a box of chocolates. Listen as he starts from learning how to walk to running across the entire country! Will Forrest and Jenny cross paths again?

Main Theme from The Godfather - Nino Rota, arr. Bill Holcombe

Tonight we present the famous love theme from the 1972 Academy Award winning film based on Mario Puzo's best selling novel. The score, written by Nino Rota, received much critical acclaim, only to end in a controversial withdrawal from its status as an Academy Award nominee for best original score.

Suite from Jane Eyre, III. Reunion, John Williams

This music from the 1970 British film adaptation of Charlotte Brontë's novel brings some of the most lyrical music in the pops repertoire. Composed by John Williams, this music echoes much of British romanticism: from a beautiful flute solo accompanied by harp, evoking Ralph Vaughan Williams, to a glorious countermelody in the horns and cellos, pointing to Edward Elgar. Winning an Emmy for outstanding achievement in music composition, this excerpt portrays of the reunion of Jane Eyre and Mr. Rochester, her complicated love interest.

All I Ask of You from The Phantom of the Opera, Andrew Lloyd Webber

From famed composer Andrew Lloyd Webber, the legendary musical "Phantom of the Opera" has dazzled audiences for decades. The love duet "All I Ask of You" that concludes Act 1, is sung by Christine and Raoul from the roof of the Paris Opera after these two lovers are finally reunited. Tonight we welcome Alison Prost as Christine and Michael Floriano as Raoul, both graduate students in vocal performance.

The Sound of Music - Richard Rodgers, Oscar Hammerstein arr. Robert Russell Bennett

This critically acclaimed musical drama gives life to the tale of how an Austrian family used music to survive in their struggle to evade the terrors of the Third Reich. Listen for the classic tunes "Climb Every Mountain," "My Favorite Things," and many more! These heartwarming, memorable and timeless melodies have brought music lovers of all ages together, and the musical has become a staple of the standard musical repertoire.



About the Michigan Pops Orchestra

The Michigan Pops Orchestra is the oldest student-run, student-directed collegiate pops orchestra in the United States. The organization was founded in 1995 by Warren Hsu, a University of Michigan student committed to enhancing musical diversity across campus. He advertised the orchestra as one that performed music that students wanted to play and that no other orchestras on campus were programming. Hsu also wanted to give Ann Arbor residents unfamiliar with orchestras an opportunity to have orchestral experiences in a fun and exciting atmosphere. To this day, Hsu's initial motives are still Pops' biggest priorities.

Members of the Michigan Pops come from all parts of the University of Michigan community. Most musicians are not music-majors. Most of our music directors have been graduate students in the School of Music, Theatre, and Dance. Today, we have over 100 members, and we are managed by an executive board of 14 students.

The Michigan Pops Orchestra is an official University of Michigan student group. We are funded by the University Activities Center (UAC).
